Preface

The information for this "History of the Rotary Club of Kew" was obtained from documents and photographs in the Club's possession. The Bulletin of the Rotary Club of Kew presents an accurate and detailed account of the weekly activities of the Club.

Rotary

Rotary is an ideal in action.

Rotary is thoughtfulness and helpfulness to others.

Rotary is the experience of men of different faiths, different opinions and different nationalities, growing in fellowship wherever they may be.

To these definitions could be added others, each different in terminology but similar in concept.

But fundamentally Rotary is a world fellowship of business and professional men who accept the idea of service, individually and collectively, as the basis of success and professional life.

In Rotary, thoughtfulness of others is regarded as the basis of service and helpfulness to others as its expression. Together they constitute the "Rotary Ideal of Service". Rotary is not a secret organisation.

Rotary does not seek to supplant or interfere with any religious or political organisations.

It assumes that its programme of service is in accord with all religions and it does concern itself with Rotarian's politics. Rotary expects him to be faithful to his religion and loyal to his citizenship.

Rotary was born out of a lonely man's hunger for friendship and fellowship. On February 23rd, 1905, a young Chicago lawyer named Paul Harris explained to three business associates, one a coal dealer, another a mining engineer, and the other a merchant sailor, that his idea was to form a new kind of Club of business men who would meet together periodically to get better acquainted and to help one another in business.

Paul Harris named the new organisation "Rotary" - because originally, the members met in rotation at their various places of business. Membership grew and soon became too large to meet in the place of business of members, and Rotary began to meet once a week around the luncheon table. The first Rotary Club in Australia was organised in Melbourne in 1921.

Rotary did not need great promotion, its growth was spontaneous. Paul Harris, a quiet, unassuming man, is, in a way, the founder of all modern Service Club movements. From the beginning of the first Rotary Club in Chicago, 68 years ago, the Rotary ideals of service have spread through six continents. They have been accepted by men of practically all nationalities with many different political and religious beliefs, by 700,000 business and professional people in over 15, 000 Rotary Clubs throughout the 150 countries and geographical regions.

The programme of Rotary is expressed in its objective, which is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise. Shortly after the organisation of the first Rotary Club it was realised that Rotary could serve a wider purpose than its original aim of promoting understanding and fellowship among business and professional people. Rotary soon became a factor for the promotion of many different types of community betterment acts and community service, today supported by many Clubs with impressive arrays of projects.

Vocational service - the promotion of high standards in business and professional practices, was regarded as a fundamental principle of Rotary. Rotarians are leaders in their particular vocations. It was here that the objective of Rotary could be put to work.

As the Rotary ideal of friendship and service to others spread from country to country it became evident that Rotary's International Service programme could be a potent force for the development of goodwill.

Although the situation is depressing, perhaps more understanding does exist in the world today and Rotary has helped with such efforts as Student Exchange, Rotary Foundation, Matched Clubs, International Conventions and with International Club Projects where Rotary is trusted as it has no axe to grind.

Rotary's membership plan is unique. Each Rotary Club is founded on a classification basis for membership, wherein, each member is pledged to give service to his Club, vocation, community and to the development of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional people united in the ideal of service.

Rotary strives to have in the membership of the Club a representative of every worthy and recognised business, professional and institutional activity of its locality but at the same time basically linking the membership to but one person from any kind of business or professional service to the public.

In this way a membership truly representative of the community is produced - a membership, which is not exclusive, but one that is inclusive of all services to society, within which any member may freely discuss the particular activity, which he represents.

Beginning of the Rotary Club of Kew

The 1950s was a decade of active expansion of Rotary in the suburbs with the formation of many Clubs including Hawthorn in 1953, Camberwell1956, Heidelberg 1956, Box Hill 1957 and Collingwood 1959, but Kew had to wait until 1967 - though the possibility of a Club in Kew was considered in 1959 when past President Doug Seeson of the Rotary Club of Hawthorn made the first survey, but it was decided not to proceed at that time. Kew has always essentially been a residential suburb and the lack of a balanced list of classifications, because of the absence of industry, was the main reason for not proceeding with developing a Club in Kew.

The possibility of a Rotary Club in Kew was next raised by District Governor French at the District Governor's Assembly on September 27th 1966, and in October 1966 the Rotary Club of Hawthorn was asked to conduct a survey, which Past President Jack Cathie conducted in November of the same year, and reported:

"The survey of the municipality of Kew was conducted by me during the month of November, 1966. The area could not be described as industrial. There are a few small manufacturing businesses and several schools, colleges and institutions. The commercial centre consists mainly of retail shops which are grouped into two main areas, Kew and East Kew. There also exist a number of small personal businesses servicing the general community, such as electricians, painters, plumbers etc.

The survey shows approximately 70 classifications available.

There are seven members of the Rotary Club of Hawthorn residing in the Kew area and some of these may join the Kew Club if it should be formed. I am of the opinion that a successful Rotary Club could be formed in the Municipality of Kew, although it would not have the same cross section of business and professional men as is the case with most metropolitan Clubs."

The survey was sent to the District Governor in January and he approved it and sent a copy to Rotary International Headquarters. In February, interviewing of prospective members began.

Success of this initiation is owed much to the enthusiasm of Past President Jack Cathie but a pending overseas trip brought the need for an equally enthusiastic successor who was found when Geoff Stevens became the District Governor Special Representative (DGSR). It is clear that the key men in making possible the Rotary Club of Kew were Jack Cathie, Geoff Stevens, District Governor Vic French and the Chairman of Rotary ??? Committee District 280, Frank Gill. By April 28th there were 14 prospective members and on May 5th, a meeting was held at the home of Rotarian Bib Stillwell and it was obvious that sufficient momentum had been expended to form the Rotary Club of Kew.

The Provisional Rotary Club of Kew

By the middle of May, Frank Gill had approved of the list of proposed office bearers and arrangements were made for the first meeting of the Organising Group which took place on June 1st at Sunninghill Reception Rooms in Kew, with Geoff Stevens in the Chair and twenty four prospective members present.

Many visiting Rotarians were present including Frank Gill, and representatives of the Rotary Club of Hawthorn who's Charter President, Ron Fowler, spoke stressing the need to foster the fellowship in the formative years of a new Rotary Club. Among the resolutions passed, the first was that DGSR Geoff Stevens request District Governor Vic French to "Constitute the Provisional Rotary Club of Kew" and another nominating Keith Hansen for appointment as Charter President.

On June 29th, the granting of the Charter (dated June 16th) was announced and Keith Hansen was inducted as Charter President in a private ceremony conducted by DGSR Geoff Stevens who, at the same time, inducted another member who was going overseas. At the completion of the induction, elected Charter President Keith Hansen read the following letter from George Means, General Secretary, Rotary International, Illinois.

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Best wishes for the success of the Rotary Club of Kew.

The remaining members were inducted at the next meeting on July 6th by Charter President Keith Hansen, and presented with their badges which the visiting Rotarian Ken Blair of the Rotary Club of Melbourne referred to as "the outward symbol of your entry into Rotary".

The Charter presentation was made by District Governor, J. Barton Hack, at Kew City Hall on September 28th, 1967, and the distinguished gathering included representatives from 31 other Rotary Clubs. The night will always be remembered as a remarkable demonstration of Rotary Fellowship as District Governor Hack in the presence of the Mayor of Kew, Councilor W. D. Hope and a large gathering of Rotarians, members of other Service Clubs, members and their wives and friends, handed over to President Keith Hansen, the Charter of the Rotary Club of Kew.

In the early 70s, the late John Leppitt, MA, commenced a History of the Rotary Club of Kew. This covered the first three years of the Club's life and included a verbatim record of the entire speeches of our Charter Presentation Ceremony, as well as more information regarding the origins and aims of Rotary. Much of this was taken from a tape recording made at the time.

Unfortunately, this tape was lost many years ago, but on the occasion of our 25th Anniversary, we were given an edited version by PDG Geoff Stevens.

1967 - 1968

On June 1st, a formal "Organisational Meeting" was held, chaired by DGSR Geoff Stevens. 24 prospective members attended with several apologies. Also present were 14 members of Hawthorn Rotary Club. Geoff outlined the procedure for the formation of the Rotary Club and distributed copies of the constitution and By Laws.

The meeting proceeded with arrangements to formally apply for the establishment of the Provisional Rotary Club of Kew, open a bank account and name signatories, to recommend a joining fee of \$17.00, and an annual subscription of \$20.00 and to nominate Keith Hansen as Charter President.

At the conclusion of the luncheon the Board held its first meeting to nominate officers for the 1967 - 1968 year.

The first meeting of the Provisional Rotary Club of Kew was held the following week, on June 8th. At the meeting on the 29th, it was announced that a Charter had been granted to the Rotary Club of Kew on June 16th. Keith Hansen was inducted as Charter President of the Rotary Club of Kew. The rest of the members were inducted on July 6th.

On Thursday, September 28th, our Charter Night Dinner was held at Kew City Hall with a total attendance of 420, which included a long list of important personages and representatives of 31 other Rotary Clubs (bearing gifts ranging from a brass gong and other desk top equipment through to cheques down to banners).

District Governor J Barton Hack presented the Charter Certificate, dated June 16th 1967, and President John Showers of Corryong handed over the Wembley Shield which was first presented at the Rotary Club of Essendon in 1964, and is handed on to each Rotary Club as it receives its Charter - Kew Rotary Club only held the Shield for a few days as it travelled on to the newer Club of Mansfield.

On May 2nd, we had our first Club exchange meeting when a large contingent from the Rotary Club of Collingwood paid us a visit.

On June 7th, 8 families set out to visit the Rotary Club of Cobram. After morning tea at Seymour, they called at Chateau Tabilk (and left with a quantity of local product), lunch at Shepparton and onto Cobram. Tours of the district's beauty spots and large commercial enterprises culminated with each couple being entertained at a different home attended by several Cobram couples. Back home on Monday night with wonderful memories of Cobram and our friends.

Raymond Martyres and Keith Holdsworth successfully concluded last year's grant to the Western Samoa project.


In Rotary Foundation, Kevin Purcell of Kew was nominated for a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship for 1993/94.

We had an enjoyable meeting there, with dinner and a tour and donated money for the student library. We made a substantial contribution to the Turkish Earthquake Appeal through Rotary Foundation. Roger Fasken personally collected clothing and tools for transport to East Timor. The redundant hospital beds which we laboriously loaded into a cargo container for the Solomon Islands has we hear, reached Honiara.

Fellowship in the Club has been helped by having one meeting in four without a speaker with resulting high level of conversation. To encapsulate my "Year as President" compels me to look back well over two years, not just 12 months. For it was then I had to consider the priorities I wished to ensure during 2002-2003. As I talked with Club members, watched, & listened, they became clear:

(a) strengthen friendship/fellowship across all ages, interests, and years of membership;

(b) develop a bold and achievable <u>local</u> Service Project which would stimulate the imagination and enthusiasm of members;

(c) help the Club to make a significant financial contribution to a major Rotary International program; and <u>let the membership</u> <u>achieve these goals</u> within a business-like framework.

I shared these ideas with recently installed President Lindsay Noss to gain his support for any long-range project, and with several members and was encouraged as each indicated willingness to join the Board. With this backing I then discussed the St Paul's project with PE Frank O'Sullivan, and he willingly embraced the idea of the project becoming part of his plans. It would be setting a precedent - but the Project was too good an opportunity, and worth putting to the Membership.

At meetings in late 2001 we discussed "how" as much as "what". We agreed: start each month with a <u>before-work</u> meeting, keep Board membership as low as possible, experiment with a few Board Members designated without specific portfolios who would combine efforts for special tasks as needed, and <u>not</u> allocate every Club Member to a Committee but rather work to encourage all Members to think/act collectively. By March 2002 we were "ready", and at a regular weekly Rotary luncheon in April were able to present to the membership "our ideas for next year."


That luncheon meeting challenged everyone to consider a program to foster fellowship, strengthen existing membership bonds and build new friendships; undertake limited financial support for a number of local youth and aged-care projects; adopt a major Club project - equip 2 sensory rooms at St. Paul's School for Multiple Disabled children, a 2-year project to cost \$50,000; and, accept the Rotary International challenge to in 2003 contribute \$US120 per member to the final Polio Plus Appeal. I asked the Club "Is this the program that you wish to achieve next year?" and gained an enthusiastic endorsement. The Board therefore set about doing its job of making the Club's commitment - reality.

At Changeover on 4th July 2002 we publicly announced the Club's program of Service and Fellowship for the year ahead. One year later we were able to report we had met our major commitments.

How did we do it? A diligent Board and co-operative Members who accepted tasks when asked by delegated Board Directors. The Board met monthly at 7.30 am, all knew the agenda details & what major decisions had to be reached before 9.00 when we had to be out of the office. The status of each project was given, immediate tasks listed & Club members identified to do each job under guidance by nominated Board Director (s), & monthly progress was announced at Club Meetings showing a steady income stream, and opportunities for everyone to join in planned activities such as working bees, social gatherings, the Hole-In-One golf days etc..

Previous Boards had tried to redirect the investments funding the Rotary Swinburn Bursary Fund as it was now not a major source for student emergencies. The other five Rotary Clubs which supported the Fund when set up by Kew were re-approached, this time with three options: (1) close it down & contribute the funds to Polio Plus; (2) direct funds towards the equipping of one room in a St. Paul's school project; (3) continue "as is" with limited calls on the Fund. All Clubs opted for (2) and our Board acted to collect the funds as the investment mortgages matured over the next 18 months. April saw the Club able to make a presentation to St. Paul's to equip the first sensory room, with representatives of the five other Clubs attending this luncheon Meeting, and PE Frank O'Sullivan pledging his Board to fund the commitment for the second sensory room.

Regular fund-raising and social activities throughout the Year enabled us to meet our commitments of \$10,090



to Polio Plus, the funding of five training places for Eastern Palliative Care volunteer staff, \$4,000 to a RAWCS project in Samoa, earmarking \$2,000 into next year's budget towards Student Exchange costs for our outgoing student in 2004, and other regularly supported causes. Keeping a regular check on members' health & well being was fostered, and as the year progressed we were able to induct new members to replace those who resigned for various reasons - maintaining the Club's total membership. We ended the Year showing a virtually nil effect on the Club's operating finances, we had completed Stage 1 of the St. Paul's School project and arranged for a further \$9,000 to become available towards stage 2, and the Bequest Fund was untouched apart from having gained regular interest deposits.

For me it was very satisfying to lead a Board, which worked as a team. The Club had <u>set goals</u> right from the year's start and just 12 months to meet these commitments. We displayed a degree of confidence which encouraged the general Membership to support the program which they had endorsed, and at the same time enjoy the fellowship of mutual service. We deliberately avoided any possible "negatives" such as "membership drives to stay alive." Judging by the audio-level at Club lunch meetings the Club as a whole was "alive" and "forward looking" - just as we had planned.

At hand-over it was very easy for me to say to the Club Members how proud I was to have had the privilege of being President of the Rotary Club of Kew while they had achieved so much in service to others in 2002/2003, and throughout the Year had enjoyed each other's company.

- A fabulous day of fun, recruiting, selling juice and Candles at the Kew Festival;
- A swinging Mayoral Golf Day with much frustration (...sorry fun) enjoyed by all;
- Re-engagement and membership of the Boroondara Family Network, with one spouse as a mentor for programme;
- + Clean Up Australia day firm fixed in the calendar with lots of good humour and followed by a BBQ;
- Members drive for collecting computer related hardware for Computers 4 Kids;
- + Foundation drive for increasing the number of members in the Centurion Club;
- Assisted a Sister Club "St Andrews North in Jamaica" with funds from the Club and our members to buy the daily necessities which we take for granted like toothbrushes and razors for the *Missioners of the Poor* thereby helping the intellectual and physically disabled where Justin McFarlane is working as a volunteer;
- + The annual Club Forum was well participated in by members and comments from the floor well received;
- + A select number of Paul Harris Awards passed by the Directors for the 2006-7 year.

On the 16th June 2007 we celebrated our 40th year in Rotary International at a very special anniversary and changeover joint dinner held for members and guests at the Eastern Golf Course in Doncaster.

In my very early years I found out that you only get out of life the measure you put into it; so as you can see, we as members should have achieved a full measure out of Rotary this year if it is judged in the light of our contribution to this our 40th year.
